**REDUCE YOUR TAXES****WITH MISCELLANEOUS DEDUCTIONS**

Certain employee expenses, expenses of producing income, and a variety of other expenses are tax-deductible as miscellaneous itemized deductions on Form 1040, Schedule A. Most miscellaneous deductions are subject to the 2-percent limit, which means you can deduct the amount left after you subtract 2 percent of your adjusted gross income (AGI) from the total.

Miscellaneous deductions subject to the 2-percent floor are:

- Tax advice and tax preparation fees;
- Fees for safe-deposit box to store stocks and bonds;
- IRA custodial fees and investment counsel fees;
- Legal fees to collect taxable income, such as alimony;
- Work clothes and uniforms;
- Appraisal fees related to casualty losses or charitable donations;
- Professional books and magazines;
- Protective clothing for your job;
- Small tools and supplies used for work.

Example of 2-percent rule: Alex's AGI is \$60,000. He has qualifying unreimbursed employee expenses of \$2,000, tax-preparation fees of \$200, and safety-box rental fees of \$100. All of these expenses are ones that are subject to the 2-percent rules. To figure the amount of his deduction, Alex would:

1. Add up the deductions subject to 2-percent rule.  $\$2,000 + \$200 + \$100 = \$2,300$
2. Figure 2 percent of his AGI.  $(.02 \times \$60,000) = \$1,200$
3. Subtract 2 percent of his AGI from his deductions.  $\$2,300 - \$1,200 = \$1,100$ .

Even though he had expenses totaling \$2,300, because of the 2-percent rule, the net deduction he will receive on his return for these expenditures is only \$1,100.

Miscellaneous deductions that are not subject to the 2-percent floor are:

- Gambling losses to the extent of gambling winnings;
- Impairment-related work expenses for handicapped workers;
- Estate tax attributable to income in respect of a decedent;
- Unrecovered investments in an annuity;
- Jury duty fees turned over to your employer.

Example of no 2-percent rule: David has \$5,000 in gambling winnings but \$8,000 in gambling losses. He is limited to a \$5,000 miscellaneous tax deduction. The amount of gambling losses you may deduct can never exceed the winnings you report as income. The remaining \$3,000 cannot be deducted and is lost forever.

Please note: Personal legal expenses, expenses of commuting to and from work, fines, penalties, burial and funeral expenses, losses from the sale of your home or personal automobile, and expenses of producing tax-exempt income are not tax deductible on your tax return. For additional information, see IRS Publication 529, Miscellaneous Deductions.

In the sun among the clouds.

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
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### **BUDGET AND PLANNING MEETING**

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
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## NOSTALGIA CORNER
