NOSTALGIA CORNER MARCH 1988

The late Senator Ike Roffman wrote a monthly article entitled "It Seems to Me" for the Knight Light. For many readers, it was the first thing that they read. Always, entertaining and insightful, Ike had a knack of making his point by letting the reader find the answer. The following article appeared in the March 1998 Bulletin:

Recently while shopping at Waldbaum's, I was approached by a woman who asked: "You're Ike Roffman from Douglaston Lodge, aren't you?" I pleaded guilty and she proceeded to tell me how much she used to enjoy my talks at open meetings. We talked for a while about "the good old days" and then she said: "I hope you won't be angry if I ask you a question." I assured her that it was very unlikely I could be angry with such a charming woman as herself and to ask away. "Well," she said, "I know that only this past summer you suffered a double loss, a sister and your brother-in-law Iz Friedman; so how can you write humorous articles for the Knight Light?"

For a moment I was nonplussed. I had been under the impression that my articles were educational and had social redeeming qualities. Then I told her that I would answer her question but first I would like to tell her a true story:

It happened during World War II. We had been stationed at an Air Force base in England about two years when the powers that be got the idea that we were getting out of condition and orders came down that in addition to our regular duties we were to engage in morning calisthenics.

That first morning, sometime in December 1944, was cold, windy and damp. The officer in charge of the exercises, a Lieutenant, smiled when he saw me all bundled up in a winter coat and the ear flaps of my hat covering my ears. I wore thick fleece-lined leather gloves which I pulled way down when the exercise called for touching our toes. When we had to raise our hands high over our heads, I barely got them up past my eyes. I noticed that the Lieutenant's smile had been replaced by a frown. When he called for finger exercises which consisted of making a tight fist and then opening the hand fully and at the same time stretching each finger as widely as possible, I could barely close my fist and could hardly stretch my fingers. The Lieutenant must have been watching me because he came over to me and asked: "How can you do finger exercises properly, wearing thick leather gloves?"

My answer to your question I told the woman in Waldbaum's is the same answer I gave that Lieutenant forty-three years ago:

"It ain't easy."

ONE OF THE EDITORS SPEAKS

Although we have such short stays on this earth, each of us in our own way makes some kind of a mark. If we are remembered, then our lives may have had more meaning. I know no one as renowned as George Washington, Abraham Lincoln or William Shakespeare in the Knights of Pythias. However, we have our own heroes. At meetings, names from the past, such as Danny Deckler, Jere Lifson, and more recently Ed Rasquin are mentioned and stories about them are exchanged. We recall Barney Linden, who died less than a year ago and who gave us our name—North Shore Lodge.

I knew two men who are still influencing us, although they both have departed from this life. In this edition of the Knight Light an article written by Senator Ike Roffman 23 years ago has just as much meaning now as it did in 1988. A poem written by PC Jesse Levine and never published during his lifetime also appears in the Bulletin. Ike wrote about going on when things are tough and of not quitting because loved ones have been lost. "It ain't easy," but otherwise, we have been defeated. Jesse asked whether the premature death of a sapling before it could make a contribution to its environment means that its life had no meaning. These men are gone, but they continue to touch our lives.

In this Lodge, as in most organizations, a small cadre of men does most of the work and keeps us going. They, too, affect our lives. To these men, who do not receive remuneration, parades or medals, I say, "thank you." If you want to show your appreciation for their contributions and renew some friendships, as well, come down to a meeting and join in the fun.
